

Taking the Bible Seriously, But Not Literally: **A Fall Sermon Series**

Friends, we are living in a time where our theological understanding of Christianity and how we, as Presbyterians, interpret the Bible has little voice in the public square. The loud voices of faith today in the media and billboards seem far from how Presbyterians understand the call of discipleship and following the ways of Jesus. Our Reformed/Calvinist tradition has always looked at Scriptures as the authoritative Word of God. Yet, we also understand the Bible to be bound to a particular people in a particular time. We approach the texts gently and respectfully, honoring its authority and mystery. We also understand the Bible to be a library of sorts, full of a variety of literary genres. We explore these diverse texts without negating the historical location and taking into account that we don't have the original scrolls, but trust that the mystery of God is with us and being revealed to us as we apply it to our lives.

It is troubling that the prominent voice on the Bible and Christian life in our country today reads the bible literally and promotes the black and white nature of faith, which is easy to believe and even easier to sell. We, however, value the diversity of theological thought and theological reflection that was present for a long time between denominations and traditions. This is reason for this sermon series in September. It's time we acquire the understanding and skills to share what we believe and why we believe it: why we believe our God really does love all, why diversity is welcome and not to be shunned, why we will not endorse the use of Scripture to be a weapon and oppress others outside the main social and cultural norms of our communities.

So join us in September for 4 weeks of thoughtful theological reflection on four major topics of scripture that are difficult to understand in our times. We will not interpret them literally, but will delve into how we can still affirm the authority of Scripture, yet also invite us to ask what they may mean for our time. Grow in faith this fall as you seek to understand the Word of God. It may not be the loudest voice today in our world, but it can still be faithful. Join us!



GatherRing Handbell Choir



LISTENING TO THE SPIRIT: Discerning a Sense of Call

Mercer Phlegar: Young Adult Volunteer (YAV), Chinook, Montana

Mercer, a newer member at FPC is taking a year to volunteer with our denomination through the Young Adult Volunteer program. This is our second member in the past 5 that is taking an ENTIRE YEAR to serve God in much needed places. Below, Mercer shares a bit of her story so we can get to know her better. We'll hear from her throughout here year and share her blogs. Please join us in prayer as Mercer serves God in Montana in the coming year!

Hi, my name is Mercer Phlegar. I am 23 years old and grew up mainly in Georgia, Ohio and Wisconsin. I recently graduated from Carroll University (WI) where I studied Elementary and Special Education. While at Carroll, I was a varsity lacrosse player and also served as a member of the Spiritual Life leadership team, among other meaningful activities. My experience in college and my lifelong involvement in church have helped me hear strong calls to serve others and to strive to live more fully into my faith, especially by helping and guiding children. The values of kindness, compassion, family, and faith are deeply important to me, and I look forward to putting these values into action during my YAV year. I am excited about living in Montana over the next year and hope to discern where God is leading me.



Greg Kuhlman: Cultivating the Gift of Preaching

The session voted late last spring to support member and Elder Greg Kuhlman as he begins the Cultivating the Gift of Preaching program in the Synod of the Covenant (the next governing body above the presbytery). The purpose of the Cultivating the Gift of Preaching Initiative is to strengthen the witness of the Church to the good news of Jesus Christ, by identifying, training, and providing ongoing support to emerging preachers. Across the eleven presbyteries of the Synod, there are numerous ruling elders and other church leaders who are called and gifted to preach the good news. The aim of the Initiative is to cultivate these gifts through rigorous training in biblical interpretation, Reformed theology, and sermon preparation. The Initiative aims to add 140 or more trained preachers across Synod over four 18-month training cycles, beginning in 2024

through 2028. Greg began his cohort this past summer!

Together with leaders from each of the 11 presbyteries and 650+ churches, we will identify 35 church leaders (ruling elders and others) each year for participation in the Initiative (approximately three persons per presbytery). These will be leaders with limited or no formal training in preaching and/or theological education but who are gifted with traits that can be further developed to develop compelling and effective preachers.

We'll keep you updated as Greg makes this journey but for now, ask for your prayers as he begins!
